This major project aims to update all martial handbooks across disciplines, as well as the relevant sections in Corpora, to better reflect the current structure, culture, and safety best practices of martial activity in the SCA today.

One of the most significant changes is the modernized format, designed for easy online access and usability. With clearer layout and improved navigation, this new format makes it easier for both newcomers and experienced participants to find the information they need quickly and confidently.

Corpora Amendment Commentary Request – Inclusion of DEIB and Chatelaine as Greater Officers

The Board of SCA Inc. is seeking feedback on the proposed amendment to Corpora regarding the inclusion of the Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging (DEIB) Officer and Chatelaine as Greater Officers.

Purpose: To bring Corpora VII.A.2 into alignment with Corpora VI (sections I and J), following the Board's April 2024 decision to create the Society Offices of Chatelaine and DEIB.

Background: At the April 2024 Quarterly Board Meeting, the Board approved the establishment of two new Society-level offices: Chatelaine and Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB). Kingdoms were subsequently instructed to begin amending their laws to incorporate DEIB as a Kingdom

Great Officer (Reference: April 14, 2024 Quarterly Meeting Minutes). The relevant approved additions to Corpora VI. Society Officers are:

I. Chatelaine

The Chatelaine is responsible for promoting and supporting recruitment initiatives and guiding retention practices.

J. Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Officer (DEIB)

The Society DEIB Officer is responsible for overseeing the development, implementation, and maintenance of game-facing DEIB initiatives and education.

K. Reservations to the Board

The Board reserves the right to appoint and remove Society Officers.

(Renumbered following additions above. See April 14, 2024 Quarterly Meeting Minutes.)

Following this, kingdoms were directed to recognize the DEIB role as a kingdom Great office. However, as there was not a Society DEIB counterpart, a variance was granted by the Board during the December 16, 2024 Conference Call to allow kingdom DEIB reporting through kingdom Seneschals until a Society-level DEIB Officer was seated (Reference: Agenda Item II.F – Blanket Variance Request – KDEIB & Reporting – 12/16/2024).

As some kingdoms did establish DEIB as Great Offices, Chatelaine was not largely due to the absence of corresponding Society-level officers at the time. With the recent appointment of a Society Chatelaine, and the prior establishment of the reporting protocol for kingdom DEIB through the Seneschalate, the lack of consistency now highlights a gap in Corpora language.

Corpora VII.A.2) currently states:

"Kingdom Great Officers are responsible directly to the Crown, but also report to a corresponding Society officer if such a Society officer exists. Each Kingdom's Great Officer corps must include the Seneschal, the Principal Herald, the Earl Marshal, the Minister of Arts and Sciences, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and the Chronicler." (emphasis added)

With the establishment of the Society Chatelaine and DEIB offices, Kingdom counterparts are now required to report to these Society officers, consistent with other Great Offices. To reflect this, Corpora VII.A.2 should be updated accordingly.

Suggested amendment to Corpora VII. A. 2 (additions in bold, deletions in parentheses):

"Kingdom Great Officers are responsible directly to the Crown, but also report to a corresponding Society officer if such a Society officer exists. Each Kingdom's Great Officer corps must include the Seneschal, the Principal Herald, the Earl Marshal, the Minister of Arts and Sciences, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, (and) the Chronicler, the Chatelaine, and the DEIB Officer. No person may hold more than one of these Great Offices at a time. The Crown may create additional Great Offices."

This amendment aligns Corpora VII with recent updates to Corpora VI, ensures consistency across Kingdoms, and provides clear guidance on the reporting structure for all Great Officers—including the newly established Society offices of Chatelaine and DEIB.

Bit and Brace, a Boring Adventure

Introduction

I have wanted to explore spoon bits and the way they were used for a while. There were several ways to drive the spoon bit by the 15th and 16th century, so the two that I selected to make are the auger and a brace. To further narrow the scope, I used the tools found on the *Mary Rose* (an English ship, sunk 1545 CE). Of the braces to choose from, I selected 81A0711 [3] and 81A3094 [3] to use as a starting point for the braces. For an auger I chose 81A5600 [3], as it was the most complete example pictured. The conditions of the *Mary Rose* find (being submerged in saltwater) meant that the iron parts of the tools are missing, so for the bits I speculated based off of other examples found elsewhere in England [2]. The basic form of the tool has not changed much over time.

My favorite brace is 81A3094 [3] – I like the curves – unfortunately, it is less practical to use.

Bit and brace in hand, on workbench T handled auger The Carpenter (fig. 1, left):

My interpretation of the carpenter operating the T-handled auger is that he is putting the hole for a peg into a mortise and tenon joint, as evidenced by the stack of boards being bored through. The man working with the twybil is only working on a single board creating a mortice. On the specific auger being used, the iron wraps around the handle, as opposed to piercing the handle. I suspect you can exert more force on a tool shaped that way, at the expense of additional iron.

The Trap Maker (fig. 1, right):

Pressing the brace into your chest provides the power for the tool to operate. With a smaller spoon bit you can control the wood that is being bored into with your hand. For larger bits you need something to keep the wood from moving. The T-handled auger can't be used one-handed; it needs both hands to operate. I find it interesting that both forms are included in the painting.

The *Mary Rose* Carpenter:

There are no images of carpenters or descriptions of the tradesmen working on the *Mary Rose*, but I can speculate as to why there are lots of bits, braces, and T-handled augers on board. With a ship made of wood primarily held together by mortise and tenon joints, should any of those joints or the beams supporting loads be damaged, a repair would need to be made to keep the damage from spreading. The carpenters are equivalent to the damage control officers and engineers on a modern ship. Only the material is different: one is wood, the other is steel.

Materials

Wood – The original tools were made of a variety of woods native to Europe. The ones that I have reproduced are made from red oak which is functionally equivalent to European white oak. They both rive easily and are open ring-porous hardwoods, but the red oak is native to Minnesota. The stock was originally harvested several years ago and now has fully air dried. As a tradesman from the time, I would have used the material green because it would be much easier to work, and then let it dry before the final shaping and installing the metal parts.

Iron: Wrought iron makes up the main body of the tool. I used the examples from the Mastermyr[1] find, where there is a steel blade attached to a wrought iron body of the tool. My wrought iron came from salvaged pre-1850s buildings. The specific wrought iron I used is not very high quality and I did not refine it.

Steel: For the working part of the tool, I chose a modern high carbon steel – 1095. The next batch of spoon bits I make will use a lower-carbon steel, like 1045, that more closely resembles the .4 percent carbon that was tested from extant tools of a similar age. The other difference in the steel used is the lack of slag inclusions and other contaminants like phosphorus or sulfur.

Finish: I used a plain, slow-drying linseed oil for finishing. There is no finish left on the wooden items from the *Mary Rose* finds. While it is possible that the tools might have been painted, that seems unlikely, as the wear from hands would rub off the paint. Linseed oil can be reapplied should the working surfaces wear.

Design

For the first brace, I liked the looks of 81A3094 [3], so I scaled up the diagram to full size and printed it out. At that point it was clear that the brace was going to be too small for my hands to operate as a tool.

Changes from the original:

- The area where the hand goes is much larger, so that I was sure I could get my hand in to operate the tool.
- Added an iron band that keeps the brace from splitting, patterned after 81A4481 [3].
- I was not sure that I could make a press-fit knob on the top, so I used the pinned handle the other braces use.

The resulting brace is fairly large. In retrospect, I should have made the brace out of pine first to check the size. When I made a pine brace the same size as the original, it turned out that a minimal change in the original design would have allowed me to get my hand in.

On the second brace, I learned my lesson and copied brace 81A0711 the same size as the original out of pine. Similar to 81A3094 [3], this brace was too small for my hands to operate. I made two changes to the design:

- Reduce the height of the bump that your hand goes by.
- Carve the handle as opposed to using a lathe. The lathe would have been much easier, as carving that much dry endgrain is not much fun.

This brace was made out of a better oak board with a little less twist than the first brace.


The auger that I made is patterned after 81A5600 [3]. I tried to make it roughly the same shape and size as the original. Unfortunately the stock that I made the auger out of has some flaws and there are a couple of cracks. They do not affect the operation of the tool; they are more cosmetic.

Manufacture

Spoon Bits Process:

- 1. Prepare the stock for forging.
- 2. Forge the wrought iron body into a roughly ½" square bar.
- 3. Forge-weld the steel onto the bar using borax as a flux.
- 4. Draw out the spoon area, work the steel face only. Leave the soft wrought iron towards the anvil.
- Taper the end for mounting into a brace or auger.
- 6. Bevel the edges of the spoon end of the bit.
- 7. Forge into the swage block and shape the end of the spoon.

- 8. Normalize the project three times.
- 9. Bring back up to critical temperature and quench in water or oil.
- 10. Final shaping and sharpening.



Stock prep – steel:

- Post vice: A modern tool used to safely control the steel bar while being cut.
- Angle grinder with a cut off wheel used to cut out a rough shape
 of the steel. These are modern tools. The period method would
 be to use a hot cut chisel and forge the piece from the raw billet
 of steel into the shape for forge welding.

Stock prep – wrought iron:

- Post vise: A modern tool used to safely control the wrought bar while being sanded.
- Angle grinder with an abrasive disk to remove paint before forging. Historically, this step would not be needed, as lead paint is a modern invention and the wrought iron would have already been ready to use.

Forging:

- The forge is a modern tool. I work in my backyard in a city and am not comfortable using charcoal in close proximity to neighbors and my house. The benefit the propane forge brings is better heat control with less effort. In period, there would likely have been an apprentice or a child that looked after the fire.
- Cross peen hammer: I use a modern 1000gram engineer's
 hammer where the faces have been rounded for forging. The
 hammers that I make are too light to move as much metal as I
 needed to with this project. My Summer 2020 goal is to replace
 my modern hammer. The modern hammers are all steel, as
 opposed to wrought iron with steel faces, as in the modern world
 all-steel is much cheaper to manufacture.
- Anvil: I used a modern London-pattern anvil (Peter Wright, roughly 1900-1930). From examples I have seen in *Ironwork in Medieval Britain*[2] and *The Book of Trades* [4], the main difference is the physical size of the anvil. I did all of the drawing out on the face and the corners of the anvil, not using the horn.
- Small tongs: Modern manufactured precut blanks, forged by me into ¼" tongs, used once the taper is on the bit. Period tongs are slightly differently shaped, mostly due to aesthetics rather than function.
- Large tongs: Modern manufactured forged steel tongs, ½" for controlling the ½" bar stock for rough shaping and welding. The

- period tongs are of similar construction, except they would have been wrought iron, not steel.
- Swage block: Modern tool I have not found documentation for.
 The block is a specialized working surface that helps give more
 consistent results. After completing several bits, I think that
 forging over a round bar would have given just as good results
 as I got from the swage block. The final refining on the bit was
 done using the corners of the block on the U-shaped forms.
- A file: Modern manufactured version of a period tool. Before using the swage block, I rounded the ends of the bit while the iron and steel were cold. I also put the bevel on the sides of the bit with a file. I think that with more hammer control the file would not have been needed.

Sharpening:

- A vise: A modern bench vise, used to hold the bit while sharpening. I could have driven the bit into a block of wood or just worked with hand-holding. The vise is a little easier on my eyes and back.
- A file: Used for rough shaping, the hardness of the bits allow me to use a file for rough shaping after heat treatment.
- Small diamond sharpening stones: A modern tool that is similar
 to conventional whetstones except they tend to cut faster. In
 the future, I will use my sandstone grinding wheel for rough
 shaping.
- Dremel: Modern power tool with a round-end chainsaw-sharp-ening stone for the inside of the spoon. I could not figure out a way to get the inside of the bit sharpened with the whetstones in my collection. I suspect that a roughly cylindrical stone with a ball shape on the end would work, albeit much slower than the modern tool. There is not a lot of metal that needs to be removed but there needs to be some.

Brace Process:

- Starting with a riven oak board, I worked the surface flat and smooth enough with a hand plane. The plane used is an 1800s design, but the function is the same as the period single-iron planes.
- Sketched out the design with a grease pencil. This is a modern tool; an awl would have worked just as well with a template to follow.
- 3. Cut out the shape with a turning saw. I can document the frame saw using *The Book of Trades*' bookbinder illustration. There is not enough detail to tell if the blade rotates, but that is a fairly simple mechanism. The saw I used has a modern blade and mounting hardware, but the only difference with the period saws would be that the quality of the steel in the modern blade is better and will likely last longer. The period blade could be sharpened, while the modern impulse-hardened blade can't be sharpened.
- 4. Refined the shape with a combination of a carving knife, chisel, and drawknife. When using the drawknife, I used a modern vise to hold the work steady. Eventually, I need to make a shaving horse so that I will no longer need the modern vise.
- 5. The knob at the end was rough sawn out with a panel saw. While it is a modern saw, it functions the same as a frame saw. To hold the knob I used a modern wood vise, mostly because I forgot to use my Moxon vise.
- 6. The hole in the middle of the handle was bored using one of my spoon bits in a modern brace. On the final brace, I bored the hole first, then shaped the handle, while for the first couple I bored the hole after shaping the knob.

- 7. The one modern tool I used that I have no period equivalent for was a cordless drill and 3/16" drill. I'm interested in trying other methods, such as twist bits and a birdcage awl, but at this time I do not know how they got a small hole drilled.
- 8. Using a 3/16" doweling plate, I made the locking dowels out of birch and oak; the birch ones cut easier. The doweling plate that I made could have been hot-punched if it was forging season.
- 9. I cut in my privy-mark with a knife.
- 10. I finished with linseed oil before assembling.
- 11. The last step was to drill a pilot hole and burn in the bits.

Auger Process:

- 1. Starting from a riven oak board, I sketched on the design with a grease pencil, which could be replaced with an awl.
- 2. I rough-shaped with an axe. My axe is modern, having a nice large poll that amplifies the force delivered by the axe blow.
- 3. The top surface was worked with a wooden hand plane to get a rough shape, while held in a modern wood-threaded vise. The vise I used should have been a Moxon vise.
- 4. The tapering under the handles was done with a draw knife held in a modern vise; again, here I should be using a shaving horse.
- 5. Drilled a pilot hole and burned in the bit.

Lessons Learned

- Make wood projects out of green wood, as they are much easier to work. I would be interested to learn if cutting this extreme of a shape would result in warping and cracking as the brace dried. The auger would not likely suffer from that.
- Make the braces full size from pine to test out the proportions before making one out of oak.
- Make the spoon bits out of 1045 steel, since it tends to not get as hard as 1095. Sharpening the bits is fairly difficult, so a softer steel might make that a little easier.
- Quench in oil, not water. The first bit had some mild cracking on the back of the bit in the bowl. It's not likely to affect the operation of the tool, but not something I wanted to happen.

Further Research and Experimentation

- Discover a better way of making small holes than a modern twist drill. Right now that is the one step that I do not have a period way to do.
- Make some much larger and smaller spoon bits. I intentionally made three that are supposed to be the same size to work on repeatability. I can find examples down to 4mm (about 3/16") and up to 27mm (about 1 inch). Although I suspect they can go larger, there will be an upper limit likely in that the amount of force required will not be practical.
- Make a manual sharpening tool for grinding the insides of the spoon bits so that a Dremel is not required to make the tool operate.




A reprint of the illustrated book of professions from 1568 that contains one of the few good examples of tools that I have found. Most trades require tools and they tend to surround the people performing the work.


