



attend Winter Market, Kingdom War College/Fighter's Collegium, Midwinter A&S, and Newcomer's Event this Winter.



Minter in the Ritchen Top Ten Food Safety Practices for SOA Ritchens

Off-site Food Prep and transportation

- Plan your shopping trips with the staying-power of perishables in mind. Have your empty coolers and boxes easy to reach as items that need cold protection are purchased.
- Try to plan your trip to avoid traffic jams and rush hour if possible, sitting still with several hundred pounds of thawing food in your vehicle is stressful on you, the vehicle, and the food.
- Plan your arrival on site with helpers that can be there to help unload and get things directly into coolers or sinks as need be.

Primitive Kitchens

When preparing meals in a camp or primitive kitchen, get all the details up front. Make sure there are hand washing facilities available, hand sanitizers alone are not acceptable for food handling.

Assess the site for:

- cover? water facilities? trash removal? Are pit or ground fires allowed?
- What equipment must be brought on-site to prepare and serve the feast?

Storage

- Non-perishables such as bottled, canned and dried food items, spices, paper and disposable items can all be bought ahead of time.
- Have a plan about where pre-cooked and pre-purchased perishable items will be stored until transported to site. Always cool foods completely and keep them below 41°F while transporting them.
- The feast planner should supervise as others unpack, directing items to appropriate storage areas.
- Before any food is unloaded at the site, check the temps on all coolers and freezers to make sure they are within usable ranges. Coolers should be below 41°F, and a cooler that has not been used or had the door opened in some time should be closer to 36°F. Freezers should read somewhere between 0°F and 20°F. Frozen foods such as dairy products should be stored at 6°F 10°F
- Store refrigerated foods on shelves so that ready-to-eat foods are on top, followed by raw fish, raw and ground meats, with raw poultry on the bottom shelves. Anything above has the potential to contaminate the items below, so foods are stored in order of ultimate cooking temperatures. Ready-to-eat foods are not reheated, fish will be cooked to 145°F, ground meats to 155°F 165°F,

and raw poultry to a minimum of 165°F.

• Have a plan for the food as it comes back into the kitchen. Have containers ready for foods that are being saved for re-use at breakfast, or being packaged up for distribution.

Hand Washing and Volunteer Staff Health.

- Make sure you have a designated hand sink and that you use it, and that everyone in your kitchen uses it regularly.
- Hand washing, dishwashing, and food preparation areas should be separated.
- Kindly turn away ill or inebriated volunteers.
- Don't let anyone use their personal belt knife to cut food.
- Hair should be restrained in some fashion.
- Encourage your volunteers to wear comfortable, washable, non-binding clothing.
- Close-toed shoes are a must; no bare feet in the kitchen.
- Discourage rings and bracelets, as well as long, dangling neck-wear.
- Don't let yourself plan on working all through the night right before the feast. If you allow yourself to become overworked and tired, accidents are more likely to happen, and things will be forgotten.

Allergies and Ingredients Lists

• Post your ingredients list as soon as you get set-up, and direct diners with questions to it. Be faithful in posting changes and additions, and make your kitchen staff aware that any changes must be recorded and not 'cheated' on. (For example, a small amount of nuts can kill someone with a severe nut allergy, it is essential that every ingredient is truthfully reported. If it gets added in once the cooking is in progress, go out and add it to the list.)

Cross Contamination

Cross Contamination is the transfer of microorganisms from one food or surface to another. Microorganisms move around easily in a kitchen. They can be transferred from food or unwashed hands to prep tables, equipment, utensils, cutting boards, other food, door knobs and handles, etc.

- Assign specific equipment to each type of food product. (i.e. poultry)
- Clean and sanitize all work surfaces, equipment, and utensils after each task.
- When using one prep table, prepare raw meat, fish, and poultry and ready-toeat foods at different times.
- Purchase ingredients that require minimal preparation.

Thawing

• Foods thawing out from a frozen state should be kept in the cooler or under cold water, not in hot water or left on a counter-top to come to room temperature. Check foods for signs of spoilage, and don't serve something

you are unsure of. Better to have one less dish than take a chance on making your guests ill.

• Take a couple of oven/refrigerator thermometers with you to check out the accuracy of the coolers, freezers, ovens, and warming equipment you will be using, as well as a good food thermometer such as a bi-stemmed metallic thermometer to check food temps.

Time / Temperature Abuse

Time/Temp abuse occurs when foods are held in the Temperature Danger Zone between 41°F and 135°F for extended periods of time. Microorganisms grow much faster in this zone, and fastest in the middle between 70°F and 125°F. If food is held in this dangerous range for more than 4 hours, you must throw it out.

Cooking does not kill all pathogens that can be present in food after being time/temperature abused.

Most time/temp abuse in SCA kitchens happens:

- when the event purchases exceed the storage capabilities of the homes of those shopping and prepping for the feast, food sits out until driven to the site;
- with items unloaded from cars by volunteers and not placed in an appropriate cooler or freezer;
- while thawing foods incorrectly;
- while cooling large stock pots of food from the stove;
- pre-cooking, storage and re-heating foods incorrectly;
- with foods used as leftovers that were not stored correctly or in a timely fashion.

Cooking large batches of food

- Large quantities of liquid take a longer time to heat than just the expanded time. Spread the surface to heat ratio out to speed the process. Get more than one burner under the pan if possible. Add a lid or create one from foil if necessary.
- When cooking a large batch of grains, instead of using a pot with boiling water on top of the stove, bake it as a 'pilaf'! In a large, deep, baking pan, place grain, liquid, fat, and seasonings. Heat oven to 350 degrees (25 degrees in either direction won't hurt if you've got something else in the oven as well, just watch the cooking time). Place baking parchment or wax paper over the top to keep the top layer of grains from drying out, and bake for between 45 90 minutes. Check after 30 minutes to adjust cooking time. No more nasty burns or sticking to the bottom of a large pot to deal with!
- Try to plan your cooking times to coordinate with service time, or to allow ample time for cooling something all the way down and then heating it all the way back up.

Cleaning and Sanitizing

- Cleaning is the process of removing food and debris from a surface such as a prep area.
- Sanitizing is the process of reducing microorganisms on that surface to safe levels.
- Sanitizing can be accomplished by heat or chemical methods. Items submerged for at least 30 seconds in water heated to 171°F and then air dried have been heat sanitized. Chemical sanitizers are usually chlorine or iodine based. Follow manufacturer's directions, and keep chemicals in original containers.
- Store all chemicals and cleaners separately from food and food prep areas. Plan for trash disposal and recycling


Authorizing for Youth Combat

From the Meridies Marshal's Handbook

VII. Authorization

A. Authorization Procedures

i. Authorization is designed to ensure that all fighters can conduct themselves safely and courteously while on the field; are conducting themselves according to a



- ii. All combatants in tournaments and melees in Meridies must be authorized in the weapons they wish to use.
- iii. Visitors to Meridies may participate in Meridian events if they go over the Meridian rules with a Meridian marshal before they compete.
- Iv. Fighters with valid authorization from another kingdom who move into Meridies may exchange for a Meridian authorization card within their first six (6) months of being a resident of Meridies.

B. Who May Become Authorized

- i. To become authorized a fighter must meet the following requirements.
- ii. Be at least 16 years old.
- iii. Combatants under the age of 18 have additional authorization requirements described in the minor authorization procedures.
- iv. Thorough familiarity with all weapon and armor standards, conventions of combat, and other rules concerning combat-related activities in Meridies.

C. When Can Authorization Occur

Authorizations can be held at any time during an official SCA function (event or fighter practice); a combatant authorized during an event may participate in subsequent activities as allowed by their new authorization.

D. Marshals

- i. For Armored Combat and Rapier combat, there must be 2 warranted marshals present. For all other disciplines, a single warranted marshal is required.
- ii. The marshals MUST be authorized in the applicable weapons form.
- iii. Inspect the armor and equipment of all personnel participating in the authorization process.
- iv. Test the knowledge of the candidate regarding the applicable rules governing combat in Meridies. The knowledge test should include questions applicable to the weapons being used in the authorization.
- v. Inform the participants in the authorization of how the authorization is to be conducted.
- vi. Perform the authorization per the Society Marshal Handbook



E. Authorization for Minors

- i. For anyone who is 16 or 17 years old to become an authorized fighter in Meridies outside of Youth Combat, the following procedure must be followed:
- a. The candidate must have either a Minor waiver on file at SCA Corporate Headquarters (blue membership card) or must complete an SCA 'Minor's Consent to Participate and Hold Harmless Agreement (General Waiver for Minors)'.
- b. For a minor to fight or even practice, either a parent or legal guardian shall be present, or someone holding a notarized Medical Authorization for Minors granting them authority to approve medical treatment shall be present.
- c. During early training, those who are running the practice must make a careful determination as to the minor's physical and emotional maturity. The variations among minors are considerable. At this age, many are unready, either physically or emotionally, for SCA combat. The marshals must be conservative in this respect. If there is any question, remember that if the minor is truly emotionally ready, they will not react inappropriately to being told to wait a year. If the marshal is not sure that the minor is ready, they must be told to wait a year.
- d. The local marshal will arrange for at least one of the parents or legal guardians to observe the fighting practice. Every attempt should be made to ensure that the parents leave with a familiarity with SCA fighting.
- e. The minor must attend at least one fighting event before the event at which the minor attempts to authorize.
- f. The parents or legal guardians shall be asked to come to an event before authorization.
- g. A standard authorization will be conducted with at least one of the officiating marshals being the KEM or designated DEM.
- h. All of the paperwork involved in the minor's authorization must be reviewed by the KEM or designated Deputy Earl Marshal before being processed by the Minister of Lists.
- i. Minors engaging in combat with adults shall be marked in the following manner: A single yellow diamond no larger than 1 inch (25.4 mm) but no smaller than 0.5 inch (12.7 mm) to be placed on the front hemisphere of the helm (preferably on or near the inspection sticker). Minors competing with adults in Rapier will have the same diamond on the cuff of the glove of their dominant weapon hand

She tats her counterpane of snowflake lace, To spread upon the forest and the mead, When time is come to take fair Autumn's place, And she comes riding on an argent steed.


And we await her coming, silently, With Autumn's bright-hued glory spreading wide, All golden over forest, lake and lea, With all the world adorned and glorified.



Winter — in From the Garden

Fall Gardening Hints Meistres Bronwen o Gydweli

The winter in our area is not necessarily conducive to growing herbs outdoors. My sage comes back every year, as does my oregano, my chives, and my dill, but just about everything else has to be replanted annually. That's why, this year, I started looking more into what herbs I could grow (successfully) indoors in pots during the winter months.

According to various sources, seven herbs do especially well for this: Sage, Oregano, Thyme, Rosemary, Chives, Parsley, and Basil. Hmmmmm.

Well my Rosemary, Oregano, Sage Dill, Chives, and Thyme are will-established outdoors, and the either survive the Winter or they put back out every Spring. Parsley used to survive as well, but Basil—well, that's another story, so I found a really big pot, pulled up my existing Basil plant (which had gone mostly to flowers or seeds, potted it with lots of good soil, pruned off the flowers. Scattered the seed

in the pot (just in case it might actually germinate), and moved the plant inside where I placed a grow light to encourage it — assuming it survives. So far, it's putting out again, and seems to be doing well.

I also already had a potted Parsley plant that I moved inside in preparation for an expected freeze over the weekend of November 8th., and I'm hoping to have it survive as well. So far so good.

Basil and Parsley are both herbs I use regularly for culinary purposes, and if they survive the Winter indoors, and can move them outside again in Spring.

But I also bought some seeds for Dill, Cilantro, Chives, Chamomile, Basil, Sage, Parsley, Rosemary, Lavender and Thyme to try starting indoors. Given my usual luck with buying seeds I don't really expect any of them to sprout at all — let alone survive and thrive. I guess we'll see though. These are at least heirloom seeds, and I seem to have better luck with heirloom varieties of — well, ANYTHING. Wish me Luck!!

Good luck to you as well, and Happy Gardening! In the meanwhile, I plan to keep researching.


