CRIER EDITOR POSITION OPEN:

The Crier Editor is a deputy to the Kingdom Chroniclers office and is responsible for publishing the Kingdom newsletter, the Crier. It is important that there be a deputy in this role - the Crier being late to Society is not an option! So if the Editor cannot publish, the Chronicler can cover for them, but only if there is two-deep.

The skills needed for this job are:

Ability to meet a deadline. The Crier is published monthly by the Society and this must be done on time, every time without fail.

Ability to use word processing equipment - the Crier is currently formatted in MS Publisher, however we need to establish a new program as MS is discontinuing MSPub support.

Access to email, Facebook and Discord. Especially near the end of the month checking email every day - and multiple times a day - is very important as the Crown and Kingdom officers may have last minute additions that must be published.

Skill at layout and design - some things must be in the Crier, and some things are at the editors discretion. You have a bit of leeway for creative content that showcases the brilliance of An Tir.

This job has NO travel requirements. The Kingdom Chronicler must attend Kingdom events, but the Crier Editor is a deputy and does not have to. There is also no equipment to manage, this office is 100% online with its own Kingdom account. You will need a computer.

Description of the Position & its Responsibilities:

Regional Deputies assist the Coordinator by serving as the point person for their area. The Virtues of Lambsquarters

Chenopodium alba. Called goose foot, white goosefoot, pigweed, fat hen, wild spinach and lambsquarters. It is indigenous to Eurasia. Plants brought to America are often found in disturbed soils where people are living. It was fed to livestock and chickens to fatten them up.

Chenopodium comes from the Greek 'chen', meaning goose, and 'podos', meaning foot. This refers to the leaf shape. Alba means white and is used to describe the color of the leaf's underside. They are light green and have a whitish, powdery coating that you can rub off. It grows 2-5 feet tall at maturity with many branches on a main stem. The alternate leaves are diamond shaped with a serrated margin, growing into the shape of a goose's foot. Sometimes the center of the leaf cluster is a pink color. The flowers, which have no petals, are greenish or silvery when young and grow into tiny seeds in open terminal clusters. It belongs to the amaranthaceae family, which includes beets, spinach and chard. It comes up as a 'weed' in my garden and I just let it grow. It has the same basic watering and soil needs as spinach.

This wild edible green is the most tasty in the spring when they are just shooting up from the soil. You can eat the leaves, flowers and seeds. The taste is somewhat like spinach with a nutty hint of flavor. It can be used raw or cooked. I especially like it in salads. The cooking time is only 5 minutes. The seeds can be collected in the fall, dried and ground into a flour or even used un-ground and tossed onto a salad or in breads as a texture element. The roots contain saponins and can be employed as a mild soap.

These plants are high in protein, vitamins and minerals (particularly calcium) and fiber. It is loaded with vitamin A. Compared to kale and spinach, lambsquarters have 2 times more vitamin A, B-1 and B-2, calcium, and vitamin C. It has a history of use to treat scurvy. The leaves have been used to treat burns, insect bites, and sunburn when made into a poultice. A decoction was made to treat toothache. Extracts from the leaves were used to treat rheumatism and gout and as a mild laxative. The seeds were chewed to treat urinary problems. When added to food, it can help those suffering from anemia. This plant is high in nitrates and oxalic acid, so eat it in small quantities or cook it and change out the water.

The Tollund man was a well-preserved Iron-age bog body, dating back about 2200-2400 years, discovered in a bog in Silkeborg, Denmark in 1950. Lambsquarter was found upon examination of his stomach and intestines along with other grains and vegetables.




Nicholas Culpeper mentions the plant known as lambsquarters in his *Complete Herbal & English Physician 1653*, but he refers to it primarily by its common English names at the time: goosefoot, white goosefoot, and garden arrach. In the *Gardener's Companion to Medicinal Plants 2016* by Francis Lincoln, Kew Royal Botanic Gardens, it is mentioned as Fat Hen. The plant is used in England to treat anemia, and as a rich source of calcium, vitamins and trace minerals. It is still used today as it was in medieval times.

Pedanius Dioscorides talks about *chenopodium alba* in his work *De Materia Medica*, 77 CE. He refers to its uses in getting rid of worms(vermifuge), as an anti-inflammatory, and anti-rheumatic.




"The Herbalist" is written by Her Ladyship. Ailynn Catriona Moireabh of Crow's Gate, a canton of the Barony of Glynn Mere. She thinks that plants that were originally foraged, eventually were cultivated and have become the garden staples we rely upon today.



Chiquart's 'on Cookery' A fifteenth-century Savoyard Culinary Treatise" edited and translated by Terence Scully, Peter Lang, 1986, is an important work to have in your collection. Why? First, and foremost Dr. Scully's research, especially in medieval French cookery, is some of the best we have in this small area of academia known as food history. The research and translation of "Chiquart" even though it was completed more than 40 years ago, are not dated. Also, there continues to be little to nothing from this time period and place. "Chiquart", filled with "culinary advice compiled in 1420 by the chief cook of Duke Amadeus of Savoy, Master Chiquart Amiczo", is pretty much the only work we have available. And, as the quote from Scully says, it includes more than just recipes, it also includes menus, serving instructions and "culinary advice" from the early 1400's Savoy court. Fortunately, it is still readily available on the second-hand book market (check out www.addall.com) so you can easily get a copy for your shelf.

Dr. Scully's introductions are always filled with so much information and details about the work he is translating and analyzing and this one is no exception. The introduction comprises the first 32 pages of the book. First, he outlines the history of the manuscript itself. Scully tells us it originally seems to have been compiled into a folio, along with other works such as Ovid and Justinian in "the late-fifteenth-century (by) Bishop Walter Supersaxo and his son George." The work doesn't seem to have been of much consequence because it was not written on vellum but on "12 leaves of the much cheaper substance, paper." Unfortunately, because of this the front cover "along with a title page, if there ever was one, and most of the first page of the table of contents" has been destroyed over the years. We are also told the original manuscript contains no illumination or embellishments. The "text cannot boast of even a single ornamental capital". The food in the cookbook is of course from the court of the Duke of Savoy, but it also likely represents the food of the Burgundian court as well since "relations between the two houses had been quite close" even before the marriage between Mary of Burgundy and Amadeus of Savoy. As is usual for the cooks and chefs from the Middle Ages and Renaissance "(l)ittle is known about Master Chiquart." We do know he was, by his own account, in the Ducal household and in charge of the 1403 feast honoring the marriage of Mary and Amadeus. He then appears in the household accounts in 1416, when he is asked to compile the recipes for the Duke and in 1420 he is again listed in the household accounts. In 1428 he is "to receive a new set of livery" and is named, along with

other members of the household, as the "cuisinier". In the section of the introduction titled "The Contribution of the On Cookery" Scully centers Chiquart's cookery in the medieval tradition with foods being processed with the ubiquitous mortar and pestle, sauces for roasted meats including wild game such as deer, stag and boar, and "game birds such as pheasant, partridge and duck", and the traditional "thickeners (egg yolks, bread, toast, liver)". Dr. Scully then dives into the "Culinary Theory and Practice" included in the manuscript and the time period before talking specifically about "Chiquart's Contributions". These contributions of course include the recipes and menus included in the book, but also some unique dishes that "are found nowhere else." These dishes include a "preparation called a Tile-Colored Broth composed of bouillon, ground almonds, spices, sandalwood, white wine and verjuice" which Dr. Scully posits "may well have been the invention of Chiquart himself." The recipes in the book are also organized in a very different way than most cookbooks from the fourteenth and fifteenth century which typically "organize(d) their material according to the type of dish". "On Cookery" organizes the "dishes appropriate for the two days of a formal banquet." Scully also comments on Chiquart's writing

style which takes a very modern, direct, approach as he addresses his audience of apprentices, cooks and Lordly eaters with phrases such as “you should” or “you will find”. And we are told throughout that his audience is definitely male as Chiquart uses the pronouns he and him throughout the work.

After Scully's fact-filled introduction we are treated to a “Select Bibliography” which is divided into section that include “Dictionaries and Glossaries”, “Works on foods and cookery” in Latin, French, English, Italian, Catalan, Portuguese, Arabic, and German and “Various related works”. You know how much I love a good bibliography and I would strongly encourage you to spend some time reading through these resources.

The rest of the book, excluding the index, is the translation and notes on the translation of “On Cookery”. You should not skip these notes. They are packed full of interesting information and are critical to the understanding of the book. In the first section of “Chiquart” we are told what “provisions” of meat, fish, spices, cheese, and other products will be needed for a feast. We are also told what cooking equipment will be needed, “cauldrons and other things necessary for cooking”. This section also includes a few recipes for pastry, broths, including “Savoy Broth”. The next section of recipes is “for the supper” and “(t)he menu for the second day's dinner”. Included are more sauces including the “Tile-colored Broth” mentioned above, more broths, two sop recipes, and interestingly, because of the lack of recipes in other manuscripts from the time period, several recipes for rabbit or hare. Continuing on with more dinners and suppers the recipes are both similar to some of the ones found before and after “Chiquart”, a camelion broth, verjuice broth, a white dish in four colors, almond milk tarts, etc. mixed in with recipes that are unique to this work such as “How fresh dolphin and salted dolphin should be prepared”, fish tripe, and “Norse pasties”. The instructions of these pasties have many, many steps and are made with chicken poultry gizzards and livers are flavored with saffron, grains of paradise, saffron, sugar, and other spices. They are very unique. Try them out and let me know if make them and how they turn out.

Many of Dr. Terence Scully's books have been previously featured in “Eat This Book”. He received his undergraduate degree in French from Oxford University and his Ph.D in French literature from Harvard. His focus on French Medieval and Renaissance Food can be further explored in his book “The Art of Cookery in the Middle Ages”. “The Viandier of Taillevent”, which is an academic yet readable book comparing all the existing manuscripts of Taillevent. He has also contributed to many academic journals, as well as being a guest speaker at numerous food and history conferences. Now retired from teaching Dr. Scully continues to research and write.



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

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
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
