Spring Event Tighlights

During the Winter of A.S. LIX the following Meridian Events were hosted and enjoyed:

• Gulf Wars — March 8th-16th (Gleann Abhann)

As usual, this was a huge and amazing War, with battles, and tourneys, and classes, and merchants, and revels, and processions, and ambiance, and the event as a whole went very well — and was great-

ly enjoyed for all that the various Crowns released their subjects early to return home, if they wished, due to potentially dangerous weather. Yes, Storm Giants (Jötnar) threatened Gulf Wars. Thor was unavailable due to the Vinland Viking Festival, so our Armies withdrew to regroup for A.S. LX.

Spring Coronation — April 4th-6th (Owl's Nest)

This Kingdom Level Event was held at a new site, Camp Misty Mountain in Amuchee, GA. and celebrated the Coronation of TRMs Lochlainn and Paraskova, and the departure from the Thrones of TRMs Barthelemy and Oda, who left to go on a Last Crusade to reclaim misplaced Meridian artifacts — because they belonged in a museum. Snakes WERE involved, but were vanquished. Competitions were also held for King's Champion, Queen's Champion, Queen's Rapier Champion, King's Huntsman, and Queen's Yeoman.

• Fool's War XXXIV— April 10th-13th (Tir Briste)

Fun and Foolishness again were given (nearly) free rein at this event, held at the Flint River Adventure Area in Molena, GA with the theme of Halime's Mermaids & Hatun's Hafla. This was a new site, and a very nice one, and folks were invited (with reason) for a weekend of whimsy and delight, fighting, reveling, dancing, and much more! Lots of highly entertaining fighting scenarios, too, as well as plenty of Newcomer Activities (and reimbursements!).

• Dreamstone — April 18th-20th (Bryn Madoc)

This traditional event was held at Hard Labor Creek in Rutledge, GA at Camp Daniel Morgan, and featured heavy & rapier tourneys, live weapons trials and challenges, a brewing competition, a scavenger hunt, egg-decorating classes, displays and demos, a murder mystery revel, and a scribal competition! Lots to do, and a fun event all around!

• Iris Faire — April 18th-20th (Glaedenfeld)

Hosted at Montgomery Bell State Park in Burns, TN, this event gave us a day of feasting, fighting, live weapons, arts & sciences, feasting, and shenanigans as well as the Baronial Investiture of Their Excellencies Valdrikr and Constanza. Glaedenfeld now has a new Baron

and Baroness to lead them forward!!

Crossroads of the Stage — April 25th-27th (Owl's Nest)

This event was held at Booker T. Washington State Park in Chattanooga, TN, and featured armored and rapier combat (both tourneys and melees) with a performance twist, performance themed classes, a stage for performances, a feast with musical entertainment, performances at a desert revel and a late night bonfire. This was a cabin site, and banners and heraldic display were encouraged at the cabin. Apparently Bardic Madness was a BLAST! Also held were the Competitions for Kingdom Bard and Poet Laureate, won by Thegn Knut Bjornsson (Bard) and Min Soo Yun (Poet Laureate). See elsewhere in this issue for their Winning Entries!!

• Black Axe — May 2nd-4th (Iron Mountain)

Held this year at Dalwhinnie Fields in central Alabama — every time we see an address this site is shown with a different town, so we're playing it safe here. The Broken Beak Tavern was open on Friday night for games and libations, and armored and rapier fighters were promised tourneys and melees on Saturday with a performance twist. There were also performance-themed classes throughout the day on Saturday, and a stage with performances scheduled on Saturday as well. The hosts promised a feast with musical entertainment, followed by performances at a traditional dessert revel and late night bonfire, and lodging was available in climate-controlled cabins (sleeping 8 per room and available to those who signed up in time). Heraldic display was also encouraged. Lots to do and to enjoy!! Also at this event an Augmentation of Arms was awarded to Dame Adelaide Colette de Montferrer, and Their Majesties Lochlainn and Paraskova issued the first Meridian writs for the Order of the Mark, to Sir Griffin O'Suaird, Master Fynlo MacCane, and Maistir Loegaire mac Lochlainn. Congratulations to all!

• Golden Lily — May 9th-11th (Beau Fort)

This event was held at Hard Labor Creek State Park's Camp Daniel Morgan in Rutledge, GA,, and promised Friday Night Travelers Faire and Stargazing, On Saturday they scheduled Dance Classes (European and Middle Eastern), A&S Classes and Youth Activities exploring Spring Festivals East and West, The hosts also planned for a Royal Court, a Feast on the field, and a Hafla Bardic Ball.

Artsy Crown — May 23rd-26th (Tir Briste)

This four-day Kingdom Level Event, held at Camp Thunder in Molena Ga., featured both Spring Crown Lyst and the Kingdom Arts & Sciences Faire, with the latter being held on Saturday and the Crown Tourney being held on Sunday. There was Traveler's Fare on Friday

evening, Breakfasts on both Saturday and Sunday, and Feasts on both Saturday and Sunday nights, so guest were also well-fed.

The format for Spring Crown was:

- Weapon restriction- No multi-weapon fighting style. (Florentine, Madu and sword, for example)
- Format- This will be a double elimination tournament. Each bout will be fought the best two out of three. The finals will be the best of 5.
- Seeding- The competitor with the lowest precedence will pick any other competitor that is higher in precedence. This will proceed until all competitors have an opponent. In the event of an odd numbered tournament, the person with the highest precedence will receive a bi-fight.
- ♦ Letters will be accepted beginning May 1, 2025 and concluding on May 18th. They should include proof of membership and a copy of the fighter's authorization card. Letter should be emailed to the Crown, Kingdom Seneschal, Earl Marshal, and Kingdom Exchequer.
- Both the A&S Faure and the Tourney were highly successful with many worthy participants, and worthy Campions named. The highest rated entries in KA&S were Lady Genovefa de Hareflot (1st Place) and THLord Rodrigo Luis de Alburquerque (2nd Place) and the Kingdom Arts & Sciences Faire

and Crown Tourney had ten entrants including:

Summer in the Ritchen

Researching Historical Feasts and Feasting Taking A Deep Dive Into Sources (Part One) By Mistress Christianna MacGrain

What does it take to research and recreate an historic recipe? Let's take a deep dive into looking at sources, comparing information, and making reasonable adaptations to stay true to the original concept while accommodating modern foods and needs.



Redaction

This term is used to define the process of taking the original source material (usually the description of a food or dish) and interpreting it, often adding formulas that can be re-created in the future, such as amounts and times (in other words, making it into a modern recipe.) Sometimes this includes a translation from either a foreign language or even earlier forms of English!

Example:

Original: **Rys moilles** – Laud MS. 553, from <u>Take a Thousand Eggs or More</u>, Cindy Renfrow, 1990

Nym rys, bray hem, temper vp with almand mylke: boill hem, cast therto sugur/ & salt hit, & dresse hit forth.

Translation: Rice Mush

Take rice, bray them, mix up with almond milk: boil them, cast thereto sugar/ & salt it, & dress it forth.

Redaction: Rice Mush

½ cup rice

1 cup almond milk (made with water)

1 tbsp sugar

Dash salt

Pound the rice in a mortal until the grains are broken.

Put the rice and almond milk in a covered pot and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until rice is soft, about 15 - 20 minutes. Add sugar and salt.

Pour into serving dish and serve hot or cold.

Primary and Secondary Sources

For the SCA. sources from pre 17th Century Europe and around the world are considered primary sources.

Examples of primary sources for medieval food are:

<u>The Forme of Cury</u> - a collection of manuscripts from 14th century England The Harleian Manuscripts from 15th century France *Platina's On Right Pleasure and Good Health* from 15th Century Italy

Sources that quote from and interpret primary sources are secondary sources.

Good secondary sources will give you a recipe from a primary source with the authors redaction

and adaptations right next to it.

Examples of secondary sources are:

The Medieval Cookbook by Maggie Black

<u>Take a Thousand Eggs or More</u> by Cindy Renfrew (which interprets the primary source the Harleian Manuscripts)



Sources that present work adapted from primary or secondary sources are sometimes called tertiary sources. They can be valuable for beginners to provide recipes that have been redacted by others, but they often omit the original material. Cooks with more experience working from period texts will be able to redact recipes themselves and perhaps use the tertiary sources for comparison.

Contextual Studies

Other sources that can provide valuable insight into cooking an historic recipe can include household accounts, shipping manifests, inventories, diaries and letters. The literature of the time, songs, political influences, legends and local folklore can all give clues as to the favorite foods of the people that wrote them. Practical considerations such as the season, humoral needs, likes and dislikes of the important diners and food availabilities etc. can all help to define the scope of the meal.

Ethnic sources are generally not as old as SCA period but can be valuable. The cookbook <u>A Book of Middle Eastern Food</u> by Claudia Roden is a good example of an ethnic source because it lists recipes in modern notation, making it easy to know measurements and cooking times and refers to period sources from the region where possible. Other ethnic sources, such as the Time - Life series, will offer meal timing, (at what point in the meal would a dish be served as well as cooking time) amounts, and big color pictures of what the dish should look like. They were written at a time before globalization really started, so they can provide some helpful background info, although they are certainly not a good place to give accurate period documentation.



Setting the Stage

There are several things you want to establish for a feast that go beyond the food that will be served. Your research should include areas such as time period, season, occasion, location, and the socio-economic level of the diners. Is it a meal for a Peasant Wedding? A Royal Visit? A Fighter's Camp?

How will you serve it? What will the Style of Service be, and what will you use for Feast Equipment and Serving Ware? Will you include Feast Ceremonies and Practices such as handwashing?

And then of course, there is the food itself: what would be available at the time and season of your meal? Are there Extant Recipes, and are there any other sources (perhaps in a different language) that you can compare them to? [To Be Continued in the Autumn Issue]



Just a Bit of Added Information on The Bijo:

A sijo is a traditional three-line Korean poetic form, typically exploring themes like nature, love, or philosophical ideas. It's structured by syllable count and is often written to be sung.

Sijo poems often introduce a situation in the first line, develop it in the second, and then present a twist or conclusion in the third.

Structure:

Sijo poems consist of three lines, each typically containing 14-16 syllables for a total of 42-48 syllables.

Themes:

Sijo commonly explore themes like nature, love, human relationships, and philosophical or metaphysical ideas.

Purpose:


Sijo were originally meant to be sung and were often accompanied by music.

Twist:

The third line often includes a surprising or unexpected element, a "twist," that provides a new perspective on the theme or story.

Historical Context:

Sijo originated in the Goryeo dynasty and flourished during the Joseon dynasty, where they became a popular form of poetic expression.



Badges for the Kingdom Bard and Port Laureate

The following badge associated with this name was registered in April of 1980 (via Meridies): Vair, a harp Or, for the Companionate of Bards

The following badge associated with this name was registered in February of 1980 (via Meridies): Vair ancient, a lion's head cabossed Or, orbed and langed gules. for Kingdom Poet-Laureate

Qualifications for Weapons Waster

Some questions arose recently when five worthies were named Weapons Masters — four at Fool's War: Duke Timothy of Long Bennington, Master Lóegaire Mac Lochlainn, and Skogar of Tir Briste, and Enzio Galante, and one at Iris Faire: Richard of Glaedenfeld. This award is not often presented, and thus is unfamiliar to many people, so it occurred to us that Meridians might benefit from knowing exactly what is involved in becoming a Weapons Master.

From Kingdom Law: Order of the Weapons Master: given to those who show great skill in the use of real weaponry, primarily throwing axe, knife, spear, and bow. The order has the right to govern itself and to define the standard of its various rankings up to the rank of Weapons Master. Members may place the initials CW after their names. [There is no badge].

To become a weapons master, you must qualify as either 2nd class rank in all 4 live weapons disciplines (knife, axe, spear, and archery) or qualify as master in 2 of these.

The requirements for knife, axe, and spear are as follows:

2nd Class: 6 sticks out of 6 throws from a minimum of 15 feet.

1st Class: 5 sticks out of 6 throws from 25 feet. Expert: 4 sticks out of 6 throws from 35 feet Master: 3 sticks out of 6 throws from 45 feet.

The requirements for archery are as follows:

2nd Class: 6 sticks out of 6 arrows from a minimum of 20 yards.

1st Class: 5 sticks out of 6 arrows from 40 yards. Expert: 4 sticks out of 6 arrows from 60 yards. Master: 3 sticks out of 6 arrows from 80 yards.

These must be completed at an official SCA gathering (event or practice) and each qualification must be witnessed by someone with a ranking no more than one lower than the achieved rank (e.g. When qualifying for Expert in a discipline, it must be witnessed by someone who is at least 1st class in that same discipline).

Qualifications must be submitted to the secretary of the Weapons Master order.


Cover Art Needed

Summer in the Garden

Identifying Wild Plants Meistres Bronwen o Gydweli

When hoping to identify wild plants that might be acceptable for culinary or medicinal uses, there are a number of books on the market aimed at cooks and foragers and survivalists. Some have information on the historic uses of these plants, while others do not, and are more geared to providing modern information such as chemical or vitamin content and warnings of potential health risks. Period sources, fair notice, do not always warn of all risks, since some plant substances in period were not known to be as dangerous as we now know them to be.

But, that having been said, there are many wild plants that can safely be used in cooking (to added variety or health benefits), or as medicines to relieve many topical, digestive, or nervous ailments. Some ancient recipes are even now being rediscovered and found to be very effective against a number of ailments, though proper identification of the plants in question is very much recommended to avoid the use or ingestion of any toxic substances.

In my garden, for example, I have several patches of Common Blue Violets that pop up

every year, and have been left there because they bloom and do not interfere with the other plants located nearby, but I never used them for culinary or medicinal purposes until I recently discovered that both the leaves and the flowers are edible.


Pea Vetch, which I'm constantly pulling up and tossing, turns out to be a good pollinator for plants and a good source of pollen for honeybees, helping to support local bee populations, as well as being edible. I knew this, because as a child I used to eat the seed pods (as well as dandelion roots), and now my sources say that Vetch seeds can be cooked and used like lentils, or the entire plant can be used as a vegetable. Some traditional uses include poultices for spider bites and infusions for eyewash, but there is also a warning that common vetch can contain toxins, so it's important to cook it thoroughly before consumption. I guess I was lucky to survive childhood, huh?

Modernly, there is a phone app called *Plantsnap* that I tried for a while, and which might now be more reliable than it was at the time, but at present the best on-line site I've found for this seems to be https://identify.plantnet.org/. Where I've been able to identify a number of the wild offerings in my yard and (as volunteers, like the violets and pea vetch) in my garden.

I plan to keep researching.


